

Parent Handbook Rossignol Elementary

Absences

Students must attend classes regularly. Mornings are especially important for young students as this is the time they learn best. If your child is going to be absent please call the school and arrange to pick up homework. Teachers need advance notice to prepare homework.

Agenda

All parents of students in PK- 6 are asked to check and sign their child's agendas nightly. Please ensure they have completed their homework before you sign. These agendas serve as their take home reading log.

Buses

The Buses run at 8:30 a.m., 12:00 p.m., 12:40 p.m. and 3:45 p.m. Students are assigned to regular routes and are expected to ride only the designated bus. There are late buses on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday at 4:30. Students must be involved in a school activity or teacher detention to ride the late bus.

Communication

The local television, scroll and radio are used to announce special events. Students are also given notes to take home to inform parents of special events. Facebook, email and our website <u>www.icsd112.ca</u> are also part of our communication strategy. Parents should contact their child's teacher if they have any concerns.

Computers

Students in PK to 6 are all taught computer skills. The computer is used to reinforce skills, teach keyboarding, conduct research and produce projects. There is a computer use policy that all students must follow.

Fluoride Varnish

If they are a part of the Children's Dental Program, students in Kindergarten to Grade 6 will have fluoride varnish painted on their teeth twice a year. This program is run in conjunction with KYRHA.

Homework

Students are expected to complete their daily work. Homework can prevent a student from falling behind. Homework is important for students to practice with basic skills. Students have agendas that are used to track assignments. Rule of thumb for homework is 10 minutes per day times the grade level (grade 3 x 10=30 minutes). Students can expect more homework if they are absent from school.

Lost and Found

If your child is missing any items we have a lost and found where parents may find missing items. Outerwear should be labeled with students name before being sent to school. Any items not picked up will be thrown out at the end of year.

<u>Lunch</u>

Students are bussed home for lunch each day. Only students staying for practices or clubs remain at school. They must bring a lunch in the morning (that does not require the microwave) to participate. Please inform your child prior to leaving home where they are to go for lunch. You may leave a message for your child if **an emergency** arises and they need to go somewhere else for lunch.

Nutrition Program

Morning snack is available to each elementary student.

Phones

Prekindergarten to grade 6 do not bring personal electronic devices to school. Personal electronic devices include cell phones, tablets, computers and headphones.

Reading Program

Students in Grade PK to 6 participate in a daily at home reading program. Active participation by students and parents can really improve reading skills. We also have the Leveled Literacy Intervention for students not at grade level in reading. This program is done on a pull-out basis and is mandatory. Students with consistent attendance will be given priority.

Recess

All students are expected to go out for recess. If a student is ill we ask that the parent send a note to excuse them from recess. Students should dress appropriately for recess weather. We do have indoor recess in extreme cold, wind or rain.

Safe School

We are a mask friendly building. Masks and hand sanitizer will continue to be provided. We have improved our ventilation system. We are asking families to keep sick student home.

Student Led Conferences

Student led conferences are very important for your child's education. It provides an opportunity to share goals and concerns between teachers and parents. Also, it is a way to show children how important school is. Rossignol Elementary has two student led conference days. Report Cards are sent home the week following the two student led conferences and on the final day of school.

School Hours

8:55 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.1:00p.m. to 3:45 p.m.The school opens its doors at 8:45 a.m. and 12:55 p.m. each day.

Second Step

We have a social skills program called Second Step. This is a bullying prevention program that includes anger management, problem solving and empathy. You can support this program by practicing the anger management and problem-solving skills at home. See your child's teacher or school administration for more information.

<u>Sports</u>

Bantam and Peewee teams are available to students in Volleyball, Basketball, and Soccer. All students can participate in Track and Field. When a student has a noon hour practice, lunch is needed. These lunches must be arranged prior to school. These lunches should not need to be microwaved. When students go to unit competitions in other communities, meals are paid for. Students must have permission slips signed by teachers and parents to attend sport trips.

Students must qualify for intramural playoffs to play on school teams. Students must play on Pee Wee teams if eligible before playing for Bantam teams.

<u>Visitors</u>

Visitors are welcome at Rossignol Elementary Community School. Please buzz in to the office on your way in to sign in. Please role model school rules when at the school.

Volunteers

Volunteers are often needed at the school. Help is appreciated with reading, small groups, nutrition, recreation and library. Any talent you are willing to share could be utilized to improve our school. Please contact administration, community school personnel or your child's teacher if you are interested.
